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21	The regular meeting of the Glendon Borough Council was held on March 9, 2023 at		
22	Glendon Borough Hall. President Donald Young called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. with the Pledge of Allegiance and roll call.

20 27	Mike Veres stated that the street light in front of 3 High St. is on constantly. Secretary B.		
28	Young will submit a request to have MetEd send a crew out.

30	Complaints-		
31	Councilperson J. Muschlitz submitted a written complaint regarding the condition of 299		
32	Main St. Solicitor Elliott provided Council with copies of section 111 of the 2021 Property		
33	Maintenance Code regarding unsafe structures and equipment. He stated that the easy		
34	route would be to contact the residents through certified mail. Based on the condition of		
35	the property, he believes there is a basis to start the notice of violation process and post the		
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property. Solicitor Elliott researched who owns the property and found a deed in the names

of Mario Russo (deceased), his brother Frank Russo (deceased) and Frank's wife, Patricia

Russo. He further stated that commitment to this project could be lengthy and costly.

Preparing a full civil complaint in the court of common pleas, filing it and having the sheriff

attempt service could cost approximately \$3,500.00-\$8,000.00, depending on the

involvement by the defendant property owners. Councilperson D. Breidinger asked about

the possibility of the Borough having the property torn down. President D. Young stated that, based on numbers received when looking into taking down the Glendon Hotel, prices

at that time were approximately \$173,000.00. Councilperson J. Muschlitz asked if the

- 45 property owners can be notified and a lien placed for costs involved. Council discussed 46 47 the fact that multiple liens are already placed

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5 Complaints (con't)-

6 against the property by Glendon, the City of Easton and the fire departments involved from 7 the 2008 fire, in the amount of approximately \$10,000.00. Councilperson J. Muschlitz 8 stated that he believes the immediate concern regarding the property is the fence that has 9 been put up and the dumping of tires and mattresses and warrants a notice. Mayor M. 10 McAllister said that she is willing to visit the site and asked Councilperson J. Muschlitz to go with her. He said that he would text her to set up a time to meet. 11

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13 Minutes-

14 Councilperson A. Weisenberger-Caswell made a motion to approve the minutes for 15 February 9, 2023, as presented. Vice-President K. Harstine seconded and the motion was 16 unanimously approved.

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19 **Treasurer's Report-**

20 Bills to be paid:

21 Vice-President K. Harstine made a motion to pay all bills from the General Fund. 22 Councilperson D. Breidinger seconded and the motion was approved. President D. Young 23 and Councilperson A. Weisenberger-Caswell abstained.

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25 Councilperson A. Weisenberger-Caswell made a motion to pay all bills from the Sewer 26 Fund and Liquid Fuels. Councilperson D. Breidinger seconded and the motion was 27 unanimously approved.

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29 **Sewer Bills:**

- 30 There were no households posted for water shut-off.
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33 **Tax Collector's Report-**

34 Vice-President K. Harstine made a motion to accept the Tax Collector's Report, subject to 35 audit. Councilperson A. Weisenberger-Caswell seconded and the motion was unanimously 36 approved.

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38 **Overdue Garbage Bills:**

39 Tax Collector B. Young stated that not everyone on the monthly payment plan is up to 40 date. She wants to reach out to the property owners once more before forwarding the 41 information to Solicitor Elliott to place a lien.

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43 **Resolution 2023-1:**

44 Councilperson A. Weisenberger-Caswell made a motion to adopt Resolution 2023-1, "A

45 resolution changing the annual fee for the collection and disposal of residential refuse in

46 Glendon Borough, Northampton County, Pennsylvania", raising the annual garbage fee

- 47 from \$200.00 to \$328.00. Councilperson D. Breidinger seconded and the motion was
- 48 unanimously approved.

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5 Mayor's Report-

Mayor M. McAllister said that there is not much going on except for following up with the
issues at 299 Main St. She thanked Councilperson A. Weisenberger-Caswell and VicePresident K. Harstine for filling potholes.

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11 Zoning-

12 Reporting on behalf of Zoning Officer, J. McAllister, Mayor M. McAllister said that there 13 have been multiple zoning applications for Chrin's maintenance garage and PennStro's 14 new office building at 215 Hilton St. Dhollandia, 200 Hilton St., applied for a fence permit. 15 A resident on Berger Rd. asked to use a shipping container as a shed in his yard. The 16 property owner of 111 Main St., where the house was torn down, asked if he could place a 17 trailer on the property due to setbacks. He was advised that he would need to submit plans with more information before a decision could be made. Mayor M. McAllister said that 18 19 she has spoken with Mr. Weiss from Northampton County regarding the proposed housing 20 to be built on the former Glendon Hotel site. He said they are waiting for grants but still 21 intend to build five moderate to low-income housing units.

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24 Engineer Report-

25 Invoices were given to Council for review.

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28 Committee Reports-

Signs- The wrong-way sign at High and Crescent St. is very faded and needs to be replaced.
President D. Young said that there are no new wrong-way signs but there is a do not enter
sign available at Borough Hall. Councilperson A. Weisenberger-Caswell said she will
work on getting the new sign put up one weekend, depending on weather. Vice-President
K. Harstine said she will help.

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35 **Roads-** President D. Young stated that the potholes have been filled.

-Striping Main & High- Councilperson J. Muschlitz asked if Council is interested in 36 37 striping Main & High St. Councilperson A. Weisenberger-Caswell stated that potholes in 38 the middle of Main St. need to be filled in first. Mike Veres asked why High St. couldn't 39 be striped while waiting to fill potholes on Main St. Councilperson D. Breidinger stated 40 that when she spoke with the striping contractor, she was told that the estimate she was 41 given was based on striping both streets at the same time. If only one road was striped at 42 a time, the estimate would need to be redone and would be higher. Council reviewed an 43 estimate from June 2022; Councilperson D. Breidinger will call the contractor for an 44 updated estimate for 2023. President D. Young said there should be money available to 45 reallocate from snow removal for road work and he will contact Keystone Engineering to 46 see if any grants are available for the year.

7 Roads (con't)-

8 -Street Sweeping- Councilperson J. Muschlitz called Martins Street Sweeping in 9 Nazareth to get an estimate for sweeping all of Main St, Front St. Berger Rd., Island Park 10 Rd. and Morvale but needs to know the mileage to estimate the cost. President D. Young said the Borough is exactly 11 miles of single lane road. Councilperson J. Muschlitz said 11 12 he will call them back with the mileage to obtain an estimated cost of sweeping.

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14 -Clean storm waterways on Berger- Councilperson J. Muschlitz said that the culvert on 15 Berger Rd. develops a pond and needs to be cleaned out. He asked if this project is what 16 the money budgeted for the MS4 is to be used for. President D. Young explained that the 17 money in reserve for the MS4 is for when the Borough no longer receives a waiver, there 18 are a lot of very costly, mandatory requirements to be done to be in compliance with 19 regulations. Councilperson J. Muschlitz said that he would be willing to clean out the 20 culvert himself and Vice-President K. Harstine stated she would flag for him. 21 Councilperson A. Weisenberger-Caswell made a motion to authorize Councilperson J. 22 Muschlitz and Vice-President K. Harstine to clean out the culvert. Councilperson D. 23 24 Breidinger seconded and the motion was unanimously approved.

25 **Sewer-** President D. Young stated that there is nothing new to report.

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27 **Old Business-**

28 **Hilton St. West-** Solicitor Elliott stated that he sent an email to Tom McMonigle asking 29 for the deed so he could prepare a resolution.

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31 **Property Maintenance Code** – Solicitor Elliott reviewed handouts he gave to Council 32 and discussed section 101.3a regarding the Code Enforcement Officer determining 33 compliance with code requirements. Council also reviewed the sections regarding weeds 34 and motor vehicle regulations. Solicitor Elliott said that action did not need to be taken at 35 the meeting but advised Council to think about how they want to amend the ordinances. 36 A workshop for the Property Maintenance Code was scheduled for April 13, 2003 at 6:00 37 p.m., prior to the regularly scheduled meeting. 38

- 39 Grants for coming year- Nothing new to report
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41 **Emergency Operations Plan** – Solicitor Elliott stated that a draft of the EOP had been 42 emailed to Council in August and the notification list and vulnerable businesses are the 43 only things that have been updated. Councilperson D. Breidinger made a motion to add 44 adopting Resolution 2023-2 to the agenda. Vice-President K. Harstine seconded and the 45 motion was unanimously approved. Councilperson A. Weisenberger-Caswell made a motion to adopt Resolution 2023-2 "A resolution of the Glendon Borough Council, 46 47 48 49 Northampton County, Pennsylvania, adopting the 2022 Emergency Operations Plan for

7 Emergency Operation Plan (con't)- Glendon Borough" and to promulgate the resolution 8 and plan. Councilperson D. Breidinger seconded and the motion was unanimously 9 approved

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11 SGS Recovery – Solicitor Elliott stated that he has not had any updates from SGS 12 Recovery but will give them a call. Council agreed to remove SGS Recovery from the 13 agenda as there has been no communication from them.

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15 **MS4-** Councilperson J. Muschlitz stated that he called the Department of Environmental 16 Protection to ask about the MS4. He was told that a study should be done by the Borough 17 engineer and would cost between \$5,000.00-\$10,000.00 and that more information could 18 be obtained through the engineer. President D. Young asked Councilperson J. Muschlitz 19 to please not directly contact the DEP while going through the waiver application process 20 as the Borough really needs to obtain another waiver to avoid excessive costs if it is not 21 obtained. President D. Young also said that he reached out to the Borough engineer, 22 Monica Wall, and asked what she would charge to come to a meeting and speak to Council 23 regarding the MS4. She said that she would bill the Borough approximately \$500.00 for 24 her time to come to a meeting. Councilperson J. Muschlitz made a motion to have Borough 25 engineer, Monica Wall, come to a meeting to speak to Council at the cost of approximately 26 \$500.00. Councilperson D. Breidinger asked Councilperson J. Muschlitz why he thought 27 speaking to the engineer was necessary. Councilperson J. Muschlitz stated that, as he 28 understood, most of the funds needed to update the storm sewer system would come from 29 grants and he does not understand why \$12,000.00 is being budgeted every year and held 30 in reserve. He believes that the \$60,000.00 already in the budget is more than enough for 31 any potential upgrades to the storm sewer system in the future. He would like to have the 32 engineer explain MS4 to Council and inquire about the status of the waiver application. 33 The motion was not seconded and no action was taken.

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35 **<u>Police Protection-</u>** Councilperson J. Muschlitz questioned why there is \$35,000.00 in the 36 budget for potential police protection from West Easton when Glendon is covered by 37 Pennsylvania State Police. President D. Young said that he has been speaking with Mayor 38 Dan DePaul of West Easton regarding the possibility of having their officers help cover 39 Glendon as PSP cannot enforce local laws or ordinances. Councilperson J. Muschlitz 40 stated that Dan DePaul has no authority and the two people involved in making such 41 decisions would be Paul James, West Easton Council President and Matt Dees, West 42 Easton Safety Committee Chair. Matt Dees stated that there would be a lot of liability 43 involved in having their officers cover Glendon and they only have three part-time officers 44 who only work in the summer. Councilperson J. Muschlitz made a motion to take the funds 45 budgeted for "the police fund" and put them in the General Fund. President D. Young 46 advised him that the funds are already in the General Fund and that police protection is 47 allocated as a single line item. President D. Young stated that the money was set aside 48 based on a discussion with Dan DePaul who, as mayor, is their chief of police and also that

6 Police Protection (con't)-

7 Matt Dees called him a few months ago when he heard about the discussions that were 8 being had. Mayor M. McAllister stated that the money in the General Fund can be 9 reallocated at any given time but is only ear-marked for police protection. Councilperson 10 J. Muschlitz stated that, where PSP cannot, Mayor M. McAllister enforces local 11 ordinances. Solicitor Elliott stated that while that is true, she does not have police power. 12 Mayor M. McAllister and President D. Young gave examples of where local enforcement 13 is needed in ticketing speeding vehicles and, in the case of illegally parked vehicles on 14 Hilton St., the State Police would not sign the paperwork needed to have the vehicles 15 towed. President D. Young stated that when he spoke with Matt Dees, Mr. Dees suggested 16 having President D. Young make a presentation to discuss with their Council at West 17 Easton's meeting. President D. Young said he was waiting to hear from Dan DePaul 18 regarding their availability, based on staffing, before doing so. He further stated that the money was put aside just in case there comes a time when West Easton will be available 19 20 to help cover Glendon as opposed to being spent and then if they come available, the money 21 is not in the budget to follow through. President D. Young asked Councilperson J. 22 Muschlitz what he wanted to spend the money on since he wants to reallocate police funds 23 as well as use the MS4 money. Councilperson J. Muschlitz stated that his taxes went up 24 because of MS4 and police protection. He was advised that the taxes did not go up but his 25 garbage bill increased. Mayor McAllister said that the State Police are often not available when needed and having local assistance would be very helpful. The motion was not 26 27 seconded and no action was taken.

35 **PennStro application to Zoning Hearing Board-** Solicitor Elliott explained that a Zoning Hearing Board application was received requesting a modification of a condition attached 36 37 to a prior variance. PennStro is now proposing to use PA 2A coarse aggregate stone (2A 38 stone) rather than ³/₄" 2B Stone (2B Stone) as required by condition number 4 in the ZHB 39 written decision of May 7, 2021. PennStro is requesting that the ZHB modify condition 4 40 to allow the use of 2A stone in the trailer storage area. Council discussed the fact that the 41 2A stone will compact due to having fines in it and will become impervious and interfere 42 with the retention basin on the site. Engineer Monica Wall suggested that the decision 43 should go back to the Lehigh Valley Planning Commission for a stormwater review. 44 Solicitor Elliott recommended that he call ZHB Solicitor Robert Nitchkey and PennStro's 45 counsel, Claudia Shank suggesting that they should withdraw their application or the 46 Borough will oppose it.

8 Councilperson D. Breidinger made a motion to add to the agenda action on a decision
9 whether or not to oppose the zoning application by PennStro. Councilperson A.
10 Weisenberger-Caswell seconded and the motion was unanimously approved.

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12 Councilperson A. Weisenberger-Caswell made a motion to authorize Solicitor Elliott to 13 appear on behalf of the Borough and potentially have engineer Monica Wall appear to 14 testify against PennStro's zoning application. Vice-President K. Harstine seconded and 15 the motion was approved. Councilperson J. Muschlitz abstained.
