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22	The reconvened meeting of the Glendon Borough Council was held on November 30,	
23	2023 at Glendon Borough Hall. President Donald Young called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. with the Pledge of Allegiance and roll call.

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Vice-President K. Harstine made a motion to add "Bills to be Paid" to the agenda. Councilperson A. Weisenberger-Caswell seconded and the motion was unanimously approved.

Bills to be paid-

Vice-President K. Harstine made a motion to pay the invoice for Solicitor Elliott from the General Fund. Councilperson D. Breidinger seconded and the motion was unanimously approved.

Old Business-

Snow Plowing- President D. Young asked if anyone had reached out to any contractors for snow removal as there were no bids submitted. Vice-President K. Harstine said that she spoke with a company who was interested in putting in a bid but they could not find the information on the borough website. She advised them to call Borough Hall but they did not.

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Old Business (con't)-

Snow Plowing (con't)-

Councilperson D. Breidinger submitted an application for a borough resident who is interested in plowing snow. President D. Young stated that there is another borough resident who showed interest in plowing. He will call and set up interviews with both. Councilperson A. Weisenberger-Caswell made a motion to hire snow plow drivers, subject to interview. Vice-President K. Harstine seconded and the motion was unanimously approved.

President D. Young stated that the backhoe still needs repairs. Mike Veres had someone who was going to give an estimate to council but he broke his foot and was unable to do so. President D. Young said that he has a phone call in to the gentleman who has been working on the backhoe in previous years and is waiting to hear from him. Councilperson D. Breidinger made a motion to spend up to \$5,500.00 to have repairs done to the backhoe. Councilperson A. Weisenberger-Caswell seconded and the motion was unanimously approved.

2024 Budget-Note: All line items were addressed. The following minutes reflect specific items that generated discussion among Council.

President D. Young stated that council left off at the previous meeting by discussing the Sewer Fund budget. He said that there is a deficit of \$17,185.00. He also stated that the only solution he can see is to take \$10,000.00 out of the emergency fund which would bring the deficit down to \$7,185.00. He further stated that he would like to reach out to Representative Robert Freeman to see if there are any grants available to offset costs. He mentioned that it is possible for the General Fund to make a loan to the Sewer Fund, if necessary, but those funds would need to be paid back to the General Fund. Councilperson D. Breidinger asked if there is no money in the Sewer Fund, how could the loan be repaid. President D. Young stated that, at some point, the sewer rates may have to be raised again but if the equipment keeps running without fail and there is no major expenditure then it is not necessary, at this point.

Mike Veres asked about using the money that is in reserves for building a garage. President D. Young advised that the money he is referring to is in the General Fund and cannot be reallocated to the Sewer Fund. Solicitor Elliott stated that a utility fund is supposed to be fully self-sufficient and tax money should not be taken to pay for expenses for a service that is not fully used by everybody in the borough.

Councilperson J. Muschlitz questioned budget line item 8400.40, usages to City of Easton. He wanted to know why \$38,350.00 was budgeted for 2023, only \$28,331.00 was spent but \$38,350.00 was again budgeted for 2024. President D. Young explained the reserves and keeping money available for when a pump goes bad. Councilperson J. Muschlitz also

questioned budget line item 8400.20, sewer maintenance expense, asking why \$11,400.00 was budgeted for 2023, only \$9,212.00 was spent but \$14,400.00 is budgeted for 2024. President D. Young stated that there is an anticipated expense in repairing the generator so funds are being budgeted for those costs. Councilperson J. Muschlitz also questioned where the amount of the sewer system depreciation of \$30,000.00 came from. President D. Young explained that the cost of the original system, which was approximately one million two hundred thousand dollars, was amortized over the expected life of the system and that amount is what it came down to, annually. Councilperson J. Muschlitz made a motion to lower the depreciation value from \$30,000.00 to \$20,000.00. He also made a motion to lower budget line item 8400.200, sewer maintenance expense, from \$14,400.00 to \$10,000.00. He also made a motion to lower budget line item 8400.40, usages to City of Easton. Both Solicitor Elliott and President D. Young interrupted to explain that the fees paid to the City of Easton are fixed and can not be reduced. President D. Young also explained that is an in-and-out fee. The usage fee on the sewer bills is the amount that is paid to the borough but is then paid directly out to the City of Easton. Councilperson J. Muschlitz again questioned why \$38,350.00 was budgeted but only \$28,331.00 was paid. He sees that there could be a \$10,000.00 savings there. President D. Young explained that is not actually part of the budget but the in and out to the City of Easton for the usage portion and that is why it is in red. He further explained that the line items on the budget that are highlighted in red are fixed and cannot be changed. He also again explained how those numbers do not affect the budget as they are a pass through and not a part of monies that can be spent. President D. Young asked if there was a second to Councilperson J. Muschlitz's motion. The motion was not seconded and failed.

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Councilperson J. Muschlitz left the meeting at 7:30 p.m.

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President D. Young again explained that, in moving \$10,000.00 from the emergency fund and deducting \$3,157.00 still outstanding in sewer bills, the deficit is lowered to approximately \$4,000.00. He said there was a \$3,000.00 deficit going into 2023 so the deficit has been slowly growing over time and as long as there are no major expenses such as a pump or pump station going bad, the budget can show a deficit. Council had no input and moved on to the General Fund budget.

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President D. Young stated that the letter from Northampton County showed the assessed tax value for 2024 is \$10,114,200.00. President D. Young stated that the anticipated gross income for 2023 was \$202,936.00, the actual/anticipated gross income for 2023 is \$299,818.00 and the anticipated income for 2024 is \$223,600.00. President D. Young asked council if they wanted to implement a cost-of-living increase for employees for 2024. He researched and found that the anticipated cost-of-living increase is 3.5%. Councill

2024 Budget- Note: All line items were addressed. The following minutes reflect specific items that generated discussion among Council.

- unanimously decided to not implement a cost of living raise for 2024. President D.
- Young stated that there is currently a deficit of \$8,110.00 but there was quite a bit
- budgeted for snow plow vendors. As snow plowing will again be done in-house, there
- are funds available to cover the deficit. President D. Young stated that a cost-of-living
- increase is something that is, typically, done annually but the rest of council still agreed
- 14 to not increase wages for 2024. Council agreed to reduce the budgeted amount in line
- item 432.49, snow removal vendor, to cover the deficit and balance the General Fund

16 budget.

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President D. Young advised council that he spoke with the gentleman who delivers salt to the borough and his delivery fee for 2024 is \$225.00 per delivery in a 10-ton truck. He also can rent the borough a backhoe until repairs can be made to the borough equipment. His fees for that are: \$400.00 for delivery and \$500.00 for each day of use with a \$2,000.00 minimum. President D. Young stated those prices are half of what the rental company ORE charges and that four days' notice would be needed prior to having the backhoe delivered.

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President D. Young stated that by reducing budget line item 432.49, snow removal vendor, from \$60,000.00 to \$51,890.00, the General Fund budget is balanced for 2024.

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President D. Young reviewed the RKR Hess contract for 2024 with council, stating that their pump station inspection fee was raised from \$380.00 to \$390.00 per month. Councilperson A. Weisenberger-Caswell made a motion to sign the new contract with RKR Hess to inspect the sewer pump stations for 2024. Vice-President K. Harstine seconded and the motion was unanimously approved.

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Councilperson D. Breidinger made the following motion:

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1. That the budget as presented and finalized this evening be approved and adopted as the proposed budget of the Borough of Glendon for the fiscal year 2024.

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2. That the proposed budget be made available for public inspection in the Glendon Borough Hall during regular business hours and by visiting the Glendon Borough website at https://glendonboro.com/notices/.

- 3. That Borough Council meet on December 30, 2023 beginning at 7:00 p.m. in Borough Hall to approve and adopt a final budget, and to adopt a resolution levying the real estate
- 45 tax for the fiscal year 2024 at the rate of eleven and sixty-four one-hundredths (11.64) mills
- on each dollar of assessed valuation, or \$1.164 per hundred dollars (\$100.00) of assessed
- 47 valuation.

4. That the biennial organization meeting of Borough Council be held on Monday, January 8, 2024 commencing at 7:00 p.m., and for the calendar year 2024, regular public meetings of Borough Council will be held on the second and third Thursdays of each month commencing at 7:00 p.m. preceded by workshop meetings commencing at 6:00 p.m., and that meetings of the Planning Commission will be held on the third Monday of each month commencing at 7:00 p.m. All meetings are held in Glendon Borough Hall, 24 Franklin Street, Glendon, Pennsylvania 18042.

5. That Borough Solicitor is authorized to provide public notice of the foregoing as required by law.

Vice-President K. Harstine seconded and the motion was unanimously approved.

New Business- None

Announcements/Correspondence

Vice-President K. Harstine stated that grant money is needed for necessary repairs to Borough Hall. President D. Young said that he can reach out to Keystone Engineering, the borough's grant engineers, to see if anything is available. He also said that while he is reaching out to Representative Freeman and Senator Boscola for sewer grants, he will also ask if they know of anything that would be available for repairs to the building as well.

Councilperson D. Breidinger made a motion to adjourn. Councilperson A. Weisenberger-Caswell seconded, and the motion was unanimously approved.
